Not everyone would be suspicious of common grooming tactics or see the risks, leaving some children to fend for themselves



they were:

Many lack confidence they can tell if a child has been sexually abused based on the child's behaviours or other signs

Only

20%

had high confidence they could recognise the signs or behaviours of when a child has been sexually abused 23%

were 'not at all' confident

The community want educators, parents, and governments to do more to prevent child sexual abuse

79%

thought there are things that we can do as a community to reduce the number of children who are sexually abused

82%

thought it would be very/extremely helpful if parents/carers were more willing to talk to their child/ren about topics related to sex 78%

thought it would be very/ extremely helpful if there were more public information campaigns educating adults on how to prevent child sexual abuse

78%

thought it would be very/extremely helpful if schools taught parents/ carers about things that could help them keep their child/ren safe 73%

thought it would be very/extremely helpful if there was greater government oversight of institutions that engage regularly with children and their child safety policies

82%

thought it would be very/extremely helpful if reports of child sexual abuse were taken more seriously by authorities

This data tells us Australians support prevention activities but that urgent action is needed at all levels of society to enhance the capability and confidence of adults to prevent child sexual abuse and to identify and intervene where there is risk.
